The REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING OF THE Village Board, of the Village of Wrightstown, was held at Village Hall, 352 High St., on **Tuesday, January 7, 2020** and was called to order at 6:05 p.m. by President Dean Erickson.

UTILITY COMMISSION MONTHLY MEETING

Motion made by A Lundt with a second made by D Segerstrom to open the Monthly Utility Commission Meeting. **Motion carried.**

WATER UTILITY

- Average of 204,000 gallons of water purchased, per day, from Green Bay Water, in the month of December
- After review of the December meter reading reports, approximately 175,000 gallons of water per
 day are being sold, so a full test of the distribution system is currently in process to find the
 difference in the purchased and reading numbers. Since last Friday, four leaks have been found,
 so it is expected that the difference in the purchased vs. reading totals should dramatically drop
 for January
- Meter changes continue on the north side of Clay St.
- In process of receiving bids for Well #2 abandonment. Full rehab due to be completed by 2023 at a cost of \$30,000 for a well that is never used and has very low water quality. Currently Green Bay Water is supplying water to the Village but in the event of an emergency, Well #4 could handle the load

SEWER UTILITY

- An abandon home with frozen pipes was the culprit of December's large (20,000 gal./day) I & I leak
- Successfully converted from belt driven to direct drive in aeration ditches at wastewater plant. Neighbors will be happy with the resulting reduction in noise
- Compiling 2019 sewer utility data to present a report to the board at an upcoming meeting

Motion made by A Lundt with a second made by D Segerstrom to close the Monthly Utility Commission Meeting. **Motion carried.**

VOUCHERS - Motion by S Byers with a second made by T Schaeuble to approve the vouchers, from December 12, 2019 – December 31, 2019 totaling \$99,056.47. **Motion carried.**

SCHEDULED APPEARANCES - None

WALK-INS – John Theisen, 1051 Debra, requested clarification regarding the procedure for plowing/sanding on secondary streets within the Village. Winter maintenance guidelines direct plowing after 1-3" of snow has fallen with sanding at the intersections. The concern Mr. Theisen presented is that with constant thawing and freezing, unplowed snow results in slippery ice and dangerous conditions for pedestrians, drivers, and rescue vehicles. In addition, resident's sub pumps are still being allowed to discharge at the curb, due to abnormally high rain totals this last year, intensifying the issue. Superintendent of Public Works Andy Vickman noted that in situations where the Village is aware that snowfall is to be followed by freezing weather, plowing and sanding becomes a priority. However, budget restrictions prevent more frequent cleaning. Public Works staff is continually monitoring street sub pump discharge.

Mr. Theisen also expressed his concern over the recent purchase of the St. John's property due to possible asbestos in the building and the high cost of continued property maintenance. Administrator Coenen explained that the property was purchased for the available vacant lot so a storm pond can be placed, as a requirement by the DNR, for our collection system. Until St. John's School builds, they will continue to be responsible for all property upkeep. Prior to the sale, an asbestos inspection was completed.
