### Wrightstown **Police Department** Wrightstown Community Conversation...SAVING LIVES



In September 2022, Brown County Exec-Streckenbach declared utive Troy "Fentanyl a Community Health Crisis." It's not just in Brown County; Fentanyl is killing people all over the nation at an alarming rate. In 2017, Fentanyl claimed the life of a Wrightstown resident. This incident is the first, and only, known Fentanyl death in our Village to date. According to the Brown County Drug Task Force, the first Fentanyl Drug arrest in Brown County was in our Village. The Wrightstown Police Department has, over the years, made arrests for possession of marijuana, Methamphetamines, Psilocybin Mushrooms, Heroin, and possession of illegally obtained prescription drugs at the "user level" (personal use). Within the past few months, we have conducted search warrants and made arrests on those "distributing" (selling) drugs. The best way to deal with these issues is keeping our community informed and educated on trends, what to look for, and how to help those with addictions.

The Wrightstown Police Department has collaborated with the Wrightstown Community School District and the Brown County Public Health Department to have a "Conversation" with our community to bring some facts to light about the drug issues in: Brown County, the Village of Wrightstown, our Schools, and our homes.

Dog Owners - Is your dog licensed? If not, it is that time of year again. To receive your 2023 license, please provide a copy of your pet's updated rabies vaccination papers along with the correct fee of \$5.25 spayed or neutered or \$10.25 non-spayed or nonneutered to Village Hall at 352 High Street. On April 1st a penalty will be assessed against the owner of such dogs in the amount of \$25.00 for each eligible dog not licensed, plus the original license fee. 

## **Annual Household Clean-up Day**

- Please have your items at the curb by 5:00 am, Wednesday May 24th.
- Examples of items collected at no charge include: furniture, carpet, mattresses, appliances, push mowers, bikes, and other general household items.
- TV's, computer monitors and tires have additional recycling fees and require a curbside pick-up tag and payment. Tags can be purchased at the Village Hall or Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- Small amounts of construction waste, less than a pickup truck load, will be accepted. Nails & screws should be removed or pounded over.
- Please place any metal items on a separate pile.
- Glass items should be contained.
- Batteries will be collected at no charge.
- Items not accepted: cardboard, bulk recyclables, magazines, books, fuels, paints, thinners, solvents or hazardous chemicals.

Please remember this service is for Village Residents Only and should not be used for other communities to drop off their items. If the volumes continue to increase due to additional garbage being brought in from outside village limits or residents not obeying guidelines, this no charge curbside service may be discontinued. Thank you for your efforts at keeping the community looking its best!

## **Deduct Meters**

Meters are available to customers in permanent or fixed installation as well as portable or temporary. These meters measure water that is used outside the home where sewer treatment of the water is not needed. This measured water amount is deducted from the sewer charge. There is an installation fee for permanent meters as well as a quarterly charge. The portable meters accrue charges by the month from the time it is rented. These meters are available upon request at the Utilities Department. Please contact the office at 920-532-0434 to pick up a portable meter or requirements for a permanent one. <u>Reminder</u>: 1,244 gallons of water must be used per month to recover the cost of the meter rental fee of \$15.00.

## Let's Talk Recycling

We recycle because it is good for our environment, good for our economy and because in Wisconsin, it's the law. Since 1990, Wisconsin's recycling law requires all homes, businesses, schools, institutions and even at special events to recycle items such as; cardboard, bottles, and cans. One of the many ways the village meets the state law requirements is that we offer automated residential curbside recycling collection every other Thursday. Curbside collection has become a common practice, however, in the evolving world of recycling it is more important than ever to recycle properly. Here are a few guidelines for the Village of Wrightstown along with Tri-County Recycling programs:

- Residents are supplied a "green" collection cart for curbside mixed/single-stream pickup. This allows residents to put recyclable materials together in the same container. This includes paper, cardboard, plastic, glass, aluminum and metal recyclables.
- Empty, rinse & replace caps on bottles, jars & containers.
- Flatten cardboard boxes and cut to no larger than 2'x2'
- Please NO plastic bags, wraps or films. Recycle items loosely in cart and not in plastic bags. There are drop-off collections sites available for clean and dry plastic bags.
- Please NO styrofoam, shredded paper, motor oil, electronics, hazardous chemicals, paints and yard waste are to be put into the curbside carts.
- Not sure what is recyclable....There are great tools available for you! 1) Visit the Waste Wizard website through Tri-County Recycling Waste Wizard - Tri-County Recycling (recyclemoretricounty.org) and with a simple search, it will tell you how to recycle or dispose of items. 2) Tri-County Recycling has partnered with a Wisconsin based company, Betterbin, to offer a phone app that you can easily scan an items barcode and it will tell how to dispose of the item in our area.
- Programs are also offered for recycling electronics, appliances, lead acid batteries, tires, waste oil, composting and yard waste within the Village.
